

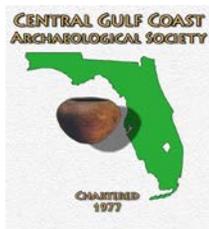

*The Other Face of the Conquest: Bartolomé de las Casas, Protector of American Indians*

The “face” of the Spanish conquest in our part of the world is represented by such unsavory characters as Pánfilo de Narváez and Hernando de Soto. Next year we commemorate the discovery of North America by Juan Ponce de León, hardly a much less savory character who participated in the brutal subjugation of the Taino peoples on the island of Española and the conquest of Puerto Rico. When he came ashore on the peninsula of Florida early in April, 1513, he was looking for more Indians to enslave to replenish the dying Indians of Española and Puerto Rico, and gold. At the same time, a priest, who would later become a Dominican friar, Bartolomé de las Casas, was marching with Narváez in the conquest of Cuba. But Las Casas was caught in a difficult dilemma: as he witnessed the destruction of the Indians through unbridled greed and military conquest, much of it rationalized by the necessity of converting the Tainos and Arawaks to the faith, he gradually questioned the justification and ethos of the Spanish conquest. He turned on the conquest with a passion, became the universal protector of the Indians, and devoted his life to Christian justice and ideals as he saw them. He was the quintessential “anti-Conquistador” and I believe represents a face of the epoch that is just as important, and perhaps even more long lasting, than the exploits of the conquistadors we are all familiar with.

## This Month's Speaker

Lawrence A. Clayton, Ph.D., received his doctorate from Tulane University in 1972. His research interests include Latin America conquest and early settlement; the Andean region; Cuba, and the history of the Christian church. In 2011 he published the book *Bartolomé de las Casas and the Conquest of the Americas*.

His current projects include : Apostle to the Indians: the life of Bartolomé de las Casas for Cambridge University Press in 2012; *Bartolomé de las Casas in Documents* for Bedford/St. Martin's, and the air war over the Bay of Pigs, April, 1961.

## Excavation Opportunity

March is Archaeology Month in Florida. As part of the events taking place at Weedon Island on March 3, CGCAS will be doing a small excavation during which visitors can observe archaeologists at work and also participate in the process.

A couple of years ago while Weedon Island maintenance people were digging a hole for a fence post, they uncovered a cache of large pieces of chert that appeared to have been internationally buried there in the past.

In preparation for the main excavation on March 3<sup>rd</sup>, the area of the excavation the 1-X-2-meter unit will be staked out and excavation will begin on Saturday February 25<sup>th</sup>. On Saturday March 10<sup>th</sup> we will return and finish the excavation and backfill our unit. Help will be needed on all

three Saturdays. If you want to volunteer, the crew will meet at the AWIARE Research Station, 1500 Weedon Island Dr., NE, at 10:00 AM.



### **Tarpon Springs Survey**

On Saturday February 4, 2012 several members of CGCAS assisted archaeologist Phyllis Kolianos in doing a survey of a vacant lot in downtown Tarpon Springs, FL. In late 1800's to early 1900's, two large houses existed on the property. Five shovel tests were dug and yielded mostly rusted iron, broken glass and other historic artifacts. The most enigmatic find was a sherd of Weedon Island pottery. The results of this survey are being accessed and further work is being planned there.

### **AWIARE Canoe Update**

As most of you are aware, the attempts to conserve the canoe has had its share of challenges. The first major challenge was the removal of the canoe which was successfully accomplished a year ago March 1, 2011. Once the canoe was placed in its custom-built conservation tank and the salt water was removed, the next big problem arose when we had a major algae bloom. Several efforts to get rid of the algae were not successful. It was later learned that alga seems to thrive on Polyethylene Glycol (PEG). It was also observed that PEG is corrosive and corroded the screen and the metal connectors in the pump.

However, we are progressing despite the setbacks and learning as we go. AWIARE is

purchasing a stainless steel pump and then will resume the filtration process and adding of PEG.

### **Stone Age and Primitive Arts Festival**

The fifth annual Stone Age and Primitive Arts Festival will take place at Ochlockonee River State Park Friday, February 24<sup>th</sup> to February 26<sup>th</sup>, 2012 from 8:00am to 4:00pm.

Attendees will gain insight into how early man lived and worked. There will be demonstrations of flint knapping, the art of projectile point fashioning; along with deer hide brain tanning, bone, wood, and antler carving. There will also be Old World and New World bow and arrow construction, basket weaving, and early pottery to be observed.

Competitions in atlatl throwing and primitive archery are scheduled. An auction will be held on Saturday to auction off donated artwork.


