Tales from a Museum Basement: New Insights on Pottery from the Crystal River Site

The Crystal River site is a Woodland-period mound complex in west-central Florida. Revisiting a collection of over 16,000 sherds previously excavated at the site by Ripley Bullen and others provides an opportunity for new insights on a collection that has never been thoroughly analyzed. This presentation by Kassie Kemp, M.A. will focus on a few aspects of the research project such as the differences in vessel types, forms, and functions and their distribution across the site. This new information adds to a broader understanding of pottery and its role in social interactions at this famous site.

Volunteer Lab




Why is lab work so important you might ask? If we as archaeologists do not know what artifacts we might have at a site, we won't know how to research them. We can learn different information from studying each kind of artifact but the ways we study shells are very different from the ways we study stone tools or pottery. That means it's essential to sort through all of the artifacts you have in the lab so that you know what you have and what kinds of analyses you will need to do. All of the work that is done in the lab is what gets us to the most important

part of archaeology: understanding the people that made all of these things we are studying.

If you would like to come and learn about the past residents of Florida, our next lab day will be held on February 20th from 10 am to 12 pm at the Weedon Island Preserve Cultural and Natural History Center. We invite all FAS members, professionals, students, and avocationalists to submit abstracts about your discoveries, projects, and research for paper or poster presentation at the conference. We hope to cover a broad range of topics pertaining to Florida anthropology and archaeology, history, and related disciplines.

Please note the following guidelines:

- Only one paper or poster per presenter will be accepted.
- There will be an 18-minute time limit for each paper presentation strictly enforced.
- Abstracts should be no more than 100 words. Submittal of conference registration form and conference fee must be completed before submission of abstract.
- All abstract submittals must be done via the online Call for Papers (form: tinyurl.com/p7gvvog) by Saturday, March 28, 2015.
- You will receive an email confirming abstract submission and registration.

GRANT

The Florida Anthropological Society (FAS) is making available \$500.00 to be awarded annually to archaeology students (B.A., M.A., or Ph.D.) who are currently enrolled in a Florida university. The

grant money will assist students conducting archaeological research in Florida. Grant funds can be used to cover the costs associated with archaeological fieldwork, special analyses (e.g., radiocarbon dates, faunal or botanical analyses, soils analysis, etc.), and, in some cases, travel expenses associated with presenting a paper based on the student's research at a professional meeting.



Students interested in applying for the grant should submit a letter not to exceed two pages that describes the project for which the funds are being requested; what research question(s) or problem(s) are being addressed; how the funds will be applied to these problems; what, if any, additional funds will be used to accomplish the research; and how the research will contribute to Florida archaeology. The applicant should include a budget indicating the amount requested and describing how the money will be spent along with a letter(s) of support from faculty.

UPCOMING EVENTS

Silver River Knap In 2015
Saturday, February 21 and Sunday February 22, 2015 from 9:00am – 4:00pm

Flint knapping is the art of making stone tools by controlling how stone breaks in order to create specific shapes and sharp edges. Arrow and spear points, knives, axes, scrapers, drill bits and a variety of other tools can be made from flint (also called chert) by removing portions of the stone through various techniques. Before metal working was developed, this craft was extremely important.

Don't miss the annual SILVER RIVER KNAP-IN AND STONE AGE ARTS FESTIVAL to be held at the Silver Springs State Park on February 20th, 21st, and 22nd. Expert flint knappers, archaeologists, potters, hide tanners, bow makers and other specialists in prehistoric skills will gather from across the eastern U.S. to demonstrate and sell their arts. Vendors will offer reproduction stone tools, raw stone, flint knapping tools, unique crafts, food and more.



There will be archery, tomahawk and atlatl dart throwing demonstrations each day. A flint knapping competition and on-going prehistoric skills demonstrations will also take place. Besides the knap-in, visitors can explore the Silver River Museum, hike or bike the trails of the state park, take a tram ride through the woods, or canoe and kayak on the pristine Silver River.


