

## Archaeology Month 2007 Event

The following schedule is planned for the "Florida Archaeology Month Special event at the Weedon Island Center on Saturday March 10<sup>th</sup>: Visit "Turtle Woman", Wynne Tatman from 10 am to 4 pm as she artfully re-enacts many native traditions in a living history presentation. Craft demonstrations will take place from 10am to 1 pm. **Claude Vanorder** will be flint knapping; **Terry Powell** will demonstrate shell tool primitive technology as well as and dugout canoe construction; **Robin Brown** will do some basket weaving; **Loren Blakeley** is going to make pottery; the native flute will be played by **Phil Penne**; **Yona Galohisdi** will tell Native American stories; and the Weedon Island staff will demonstrate atlatl throwing.

At 1:00 pm **Dr. Robin Brown**, a noted author, will present "**Gulf Coast Cuisine-The Wonderful Bounty of the Estuaries**".

Dr. Brown will describe how aboriginal Floridians acquired the diverse foods found in the Gulf. He will also provide a fascinating discussion about techniques employed by today's archaeologists as they study the diets of Florida's first peoples. Dr. Brown is the author of several popular books on Native American cultures including *Florida's First People* and *The Crafts of Florida's First People*.


## 2008 Annual Meeting

## In Print



*The Invisible Sex: Uncovering the True Role of Women in Prehistory*, by J.M. Adovasio, Olga Soffer, and Jake Page, published by Harper-Collins, 2007, 302pp. with illus., ISBN-13:978-0-06-117091-1, \$26.95.

Shaped by cartoons and museum dioramas, our vision of Paleolithic times tends to feature fur-clad male hunters fearlessly attacking mammoths while timid women hover fearfully behind a boulder. In fact, recent research has shown that this vision bears little relation to reality.

The field of archaeology has changed dramatically in the past two decades, as women have challenged their male colleagues' exclusive focus on hard artifacts such as spear points rather than tougher to find evidence of women's work. J. M. Adovasio and Olga Soffer are two of the world's leading experts on perishable artifacts such as basketry, cordage, and weaving. In *The Invisible Sex*, the authors present an exciting new look at prehistory, arguing that women invented all kinds of critical materials, including the clothing necessary for life in colder climates, the ropes used to make rafts that enabled long-distance travel by water, and nets used for communal hunting. Even more important, women played a central role in the development of language and social life—in short, in our becoming human. In this eye-opening book, a new story about women in prehistory emerges with provocative implications for our assumptions about gender today.
