The Weedon Island Canoe – A Success Story

It slumbered for nearly a thousand years having endured battering tides, changing climate, and invasive vegetation. Discovered in 2001, recovered in 2011 and preserved, it is now on display at the Weedon Island Cultural and Natural History Center. Records exist for approximately four hundred prehistoric Florida canoes that survived in waterlogged environments, but this one is special. It is the longest and the only saltwater canoe recovered and preserved in Florida. We may never discover its passengers or its cargo, but because of the dedication and perseverance of all those who participated in keeping alive this “shard” of Florida’s past, we recognize that watercraft furnished the major means of transportation before trains, planes, and automobiles. It is a perfect example of “thinking globally, but acting locally,” and is an important addition to the story of Florida’s Maritime Heritage.

CITY OF ST PETERSBURG BUYS LAND NEAR ABERCROMBIE PARK TO PRESERVE MORE OF ARCHAEOLOGICAL SITE

Great news for those who love archaeological sites, the City of St Petersburg will be purchasing land adjacent to Abercrombie Park that contains part of an important archaeological site in order to better preserve it! The property is owned by friend of CGCAS Evelyn Kuttler, who had heard that the city was working on preserving archaeological sites in their parks and “called city parks officials and said she wanted to sell her property — 2.4 acres on the north side of the park with 215 feet of Boca Ciega Bay waterfront.” From the *Tampa Tribune*: “Parks and Recreation Director Mike Jefferis seized the chance and, on Thursday, about a year after Kuttler’s offer, the City Council voted unanimously to buy the property for \$1.7 million, which includes Kuttler’s 76-year-old home and some smaller out buildings. “We’re absolutely thrilled,” Jefferis said. “It’s very exciting.””




A view of the water from Abercrombie Park.

The Kuttler property and the shell mound that it contains is part of the larger Bayshore Homes archaeological site complex, which also includes Abercrombie Park. CGCAS conducted a small excavation at the mound in 1999 under the direction of Dr. Robert Austin. City of St Petersburg Parks Department plans on including interpretive panels and displays at the newly expanded park in order to educate the public about this important piece of the city’s prehistoric past. 

GRAND OPENING! WEEDON ISLAND CANOE EXHIBIT “NAVIGATING TAMPA BAY’S MARITIME PAST”



For over a thousand years, an ancient dugout canoe lay buried under mangrove peat near a shoreline on Old Tampa Bay at Weedon Island Preserve. Since its discovery in 2001, archaeologists have investigated, excavated, analyzed, and conserved this ancient treasure. The 1,100-year-old canoe will soon be on display at the Weedon Island Preserve Cultural and Natural History Center in an exciting new exhibit, "Navigating Tampa Bay's Maritime Past." The Public Grand Opening of Florida's longest, (40 feet), and only saltwater dugout canoe is Saturday, October 17, 2015 from 10 AM until 3 PM. Come talk to the experts from the Alliance for Weedon Island Archaeological Research and Education (AWIARE) and learn about this amazing discovery and how it expands our knowledge of the prehistory of the Tampa Bay region.

How Virtual Technologies are Changing Archaeology
Wednesday, October 21, 2015 from 6 – 7pm

What is the future of the past? This talk discusses how the interactive and immersive aspects of virtual reality, video games, and online worlds benefit the

public's engagement with and understanding of the past. Dr. Edward Gonzalez-Tennant will highlight how these emerging technologies are changing archaeology with case studies drawn from Florida and the Caribbean, including Rosewood, Kingsley Plantation, and an upcoming serious game exploring St Augustine's 450-year history. Dr. Gonzalez-Tennant earned his PhD in 2011 for his pioneering work on the application of virtual technologies to reconstructing the destroyed community of Rosewood in Levy County. He has conducted research on five continents and has published widely on the use of virtual technologies, computer mapping, and new media within archaeology.



How Oceanographic Effects Influenced the Prehistoric Colonization of Islands: A Caribbean-Pacific Comparison
Thursday, November 19, 2015 from 7 – 8pm

For many island societies worldwide, the acquisition and exchange of prized resources was fundamental to developing and maintaining social, political, and economic relationships. The patchiness of resources such as stone, clay, tempering agents, shell, and animals often led to differential access, which then helped to fuel the rise of social complexity. This presentation by Scott M. Fitzpatrick, Ph.D. considers questions of resource acquisition and population movements as mediated by oceanographic and wind conditions. Comparing results from archaeological and other lines of evidence in the Caribbean and Pacific Islands highlights the role of seafaring capabilities as a critical factor in structuring colonization, population dispersals, and inter-island and island-mainland interaction.

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
