

Recent Investigations at the Yon Mound and Village Site (8Li2)

Jeff Du Vernay is a Ph.D. student in the Department of Anthropology at the University of South Florida researching the Fort Walton period in the Apalachicola River valley of northwest Florida. He earned his Master's degree in anthropology from Florida State University where he focused on Florida's Mission period and Formative period Mesoamerica. Although his primary archaeological interests are in the Florida panhandle, Jeff has participated in archaeological field research throughout the state of Florida over the last seven years.

Yon mound and village is a Fort Walton period site located in Liberty County, Florida along the Apalachicola River. In May 2007, the University of South Florida Department of Anthropology conducted test excavations at Yon during a 3-week archaeological field school in support of his ongoing dissertation research. These excavations provided insight into Yon platform mound construction and revealed a rich garbage pit with large pieces of broken pottery, deer bone and antler, river bivalve shells, and a broken grinding stone. His talk will detail the findings of this field research and will address questions concerning the Fort Walton period in the Apalachicola River valley.

FAS Has Lost a Dear Friend

Many of us who have been involved in FAS and Florida archaeology for several years, had the opportunity to meet, work with, and get to know a very special person. It is

with sadness that the passing of Art Lee is announced. He passed away on November 15 2007 in Naples Florida at the age of 92.

He was active in FAS and served as its President in 1992. He also was an active member of the Southwest Florida Archeological Society and helped establish the Craighead Laboratory at the Collier County Museum. Art was the recipient of the FAS Lazarus Award for his contributions as an avocational archaeologist and he presented with the FAS President's Award for his outstanding contributions to the Society.

He is survived by his wife of 70 years, Lynn; son Arthur III and his wife Rosemary; and a granddaughter Miranda Lee.

He will be sorely missed. A longer tribute to Art will appear in the January FAS newsletter and *The Florida Anthropologist*.

Clovis Dethroned Rebuttal

Editor's note: *The article in last month's newsletter presented a shortened version of an article that appeared in the Mammoth Trumpet and Science titled "Clovis Dethroned" submitted by Pete Peterson. To accurately convey both sides of the issue, the rebuttal to the Haynes et al. article by Waters and Stafford was not presented. Their rebuttal was published in the July 20, 2007 Vol. 317, no. 5836 issue of Science on page 320. CGCAS does not take sides in this debate and the main goal of each newsletter is to inform the members of events occurring in various areas of archaeology. Response to Comment on "Redefining the Age of Clovis: Implications for the peopling of the Americas", Michael R. Waters and Thomas W. Stafford, Jr.

Haynes *et al.* misrepresent several aspects of our study. Our revised dates and other archaeological data imply that Clovis does not represent the earliest occupation of the Americas, and we offered both human migration and technology diffusion as hypotheses to explain the expansion of Clovis. We stand by the data and conclusions presented in our original report.
