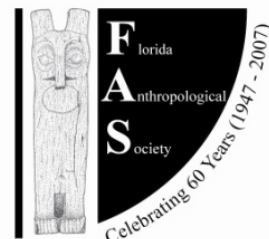

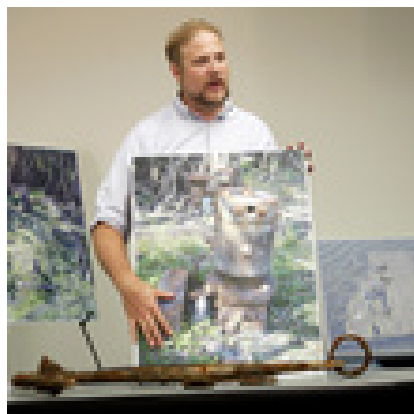

Lake Okeechobee Archeological Sites

When Chris Davenport, Palm Beach County's Archaeologist, and Greg Mount went to investigate a report of human remains being exposed on the bottom of Lake Okeechobee they found more than they expected. Prior to their investigation, there were only three known sites in Lake Okeechobee. Now, after a year-long survey, they have identified 33 new archeological sites. This lecture will discuss the new sites and the insights they provide.

FAS 2008 Annual Meeting

The 60th Annual Meeting of the Florida Anthropological Society will be hosted by the Central Gulf Coast Archaeological Society (CGCAS) from May 2-4, 2008. The meeting will be held in Ybor City/Tampa. Known as Tampa's Latin Quarter for over a century, Ybor City is an exotic blend of aromas, flavor, sights and sounds. Founded by Vicente Martinez-Ybor as a cigar manufacturing center, Ybor City is one of only two National Historic Landmark Districts in Florida. Red brick buildings, wrought iron balconies, and narrow brick street give it an Old World charm that offers a refreshing change of pace. Excellent restaurants, eclectic shops and art galleries, plus a variety of pubs, patio bars, and nightclubs make Ybor City one of Florida's top-ranked entertainment and shopping districts.

Friday's meetings will be held at the Hampton Inn & Suites, 1301 East 7th Avenue, Ybor City. The Friday night reception and FAC Stewards of Heritage Award presentation will be held at Ybor City Museum State Park, 1818 E. 9th Avenue, Ybor City. The venue for the Saturday meeting will be the L'Unione Italiana (the Italian Club) at 1732 East 7th Avenue, Ybor City. Parking at the Italian Club is free on Saturday for the meeting attendees.

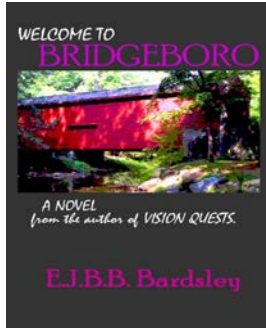

Elaine Bardsley's New Novel



CGCAS member, Elaine Bardsley, who writes under the pen name E.J.B.B. Bardsley, announces the publication of her newest novel, *Welcome to Bridgeborough*. Founded in 1720, Bridgeborough is the site of the famous battle of Neshaminy Creek which was fought there in 1776. Captain Nathan Taylor, who led the troops of the Continental Army to victory, was mortally wounded during the battle. He is buried in the cemetery of the Warwick Presbyterian Church in Hartsville. The novel is sponsored by the Bridgeborough Historical Society.

Our Law Makers at Work

How Many Doubloons Would Cover the State's Budget Shortfall

With the state desperate for cash to balance its budget, one lawmaker has come up with a solution worthy of Blackbeard. Rep. Juan Zapata, R- Miami, wants to sell Florida's collection of Spanish treasure: doubloons and other coins, gold and silver ingots and chains. "We have some interesting goodies in the closet," Zapata told the Miami Herald. "Why not have an interesting garage sale, put them out there and see what we can get for them." One expert valued the collection, one of the world's largest publicly owned collections, at \$17-million. Much of it is kept in a vault and occasionally lent to museums. State officials said the collection was priceless and auctioning it off should be out of the question. (*St. Pete Times* 4/12/2008)
